3.75(a)

Housing facilities, general.

USDA inspectors identified an opening at the roof of an enclosure housing two white-faced capuchins. The metal shade structures on the roof had collapsed inward, breaking the metal support structures holding the metal fencing together and creating an opening large enough for the animals to escape. The two capuchins were immediately removed from the damaged enclosure and reestablished in a secure one. Animals may be injured or harmed when they access outside areas. Gaining unauthorized access outside could have resulted in animal or human injury. Housing facilities for nonhuman primates shall be structurally sound and maintained to protect and contain the animals securely.

USDA inspectors identified a plastic Tupperware container in the Munchkin land kitchen containing dry peanuts that were growing a green fuzzy mold. The container top had been left slightly ajar and the peanuts subsequently grew mold.

Additionally, USDA inspectors observed deceased insect bodies on the same shelf that the peanut storage container was found.

The ingestion of mold is inherently detrimental to the health and welfare of animals. Additionally, the top of the food

container was left unsecured and did not protect the peanuts from possible contamination from pests. Food must be clean, wholesome, and palatable to the animals. The facility staff cleaned out the kitchen shelves and discarded the moldy peanuts before the inspection was completed.

**3.84(d) Repeat
Cleaning, sanitization, housekeeping, and pest control.**

The current pest control program continues to fall short in its effectiveness in reducing contamination by pests in animal areas. Deceased insect bodies were seen on the same shelf where food was being stored in the Munchkin land. A small circular hole was identified in the wall of an indoor housing trailer in Emerald city. This is the same area where facility staff observed a squirrel monkey mouthing the body of a deceased rat. Moreover, a racoon was spotted by facility staff in the vicinity of Kansas City capuchin enclosures during the second day of inspections.

Mammalian and insect pests can both carry parasites and various diseases that could compromise the health and well-being of nonhuman primates. Licensees are responsible for establishing and maintaining an effective program for controlling pests so as to promote the health and well-being of the animals and reduce contamination by pests in animal areas.

This inspection took place over two days (September 29th-30th) with the facility director and several employees. The exit interview was conducted with the facility director on September 30th.
